


As your Yolo Reads program coordinator, I want to encourage you all to discuss educational pathways with your learner. Our program is one small part of the educational outlets available in Yolo County. Yolo Reads received a grant that helped us support our community by offering ESL courses at the Esparto Regional Library in collaboration with the Woodland Community College.

Entering adult school or Community
College is a rite of passage for many
families and can have a lasting positive
effect. A parent's commitment to time
invested in educational attainment is
the biggest indicator of a positive intergenerational effect on literacy levels.
Your investment in educational services
and opportunities allows your learner to
access a pathway, assists them in staying on the pathway and builds the skills
they need to maintain resiliency and
agency in pursuit of their dreams.

Yolo Reads has found that our program's design in providing one-on-one mentoring relationships and a learner-centered mindset builds self-determinism and resiliency. It is our commitment which transforms an opportunity into success.

TEN TIPS FOR HELPING YOUR CHILD WITH HOMEWORK

Tutor Submission

Lucia Kaiser submitted this article as a resource she uses and adapts for her learner.

1. Provide a quiet space and materi- 7. als.

Make sure kids have a desk or table with good lighting. Provide a quiet space. Provide paper, pencils, glue, scissors, a dictionary, and other supplies. Before leaving school, make sure your children bring home everything they need.

2. Set a schedule.

Plan a schedule with study and free time. Some kids work best in the afternoon. Others like to wait until after dinner. Set a routine that works for your child.

3. Limit distractions.

Limit TV, cell phone, and computer use during homework. Allow computer time only to do homework. Children will finish their work sooner if you limit distractions.

4. Be ready to help.

Review directions. Do a problem together. Watch as your child does the next one. Make homework a priority.

5. Avoid giving the answers.

Instead, ask questions to help your child see the problem in a different way. Kids learn best when they have to think for themselves.

6. Use an assignment book.

Give your children a notebook to write down assignments. This will help them re-

member everything. Compare their work and the notebook. Check that everything is done.

7. Meet the teacher.

Go to school events to meet your child's teacher. Ask how you can help with homework. Ask if the teacher has a website where assignments are listed. Find out if the school has tutors or study sessions. Share your concerns with the teacher about homework. Tell the teacher if your child cannot do most of the work alone.

8. Review work and mistakes.

Look over graded assignments. Don't punish your child for bad grades or mistakes. Discuss errors to be sure your child understands. Incorrect answers are an opportunity to learn. It is a good idea to help your child learn the correct answer.

9. Encourage healthy habits.

Many kids do not get enough sleep. If your child falls asleep while doing homework, start earlier. Set an earlier bedtime. You may need to limit some extra activities. Encourage children to eat healthy foods and be physically active.

10. Praise your child's work and efforts.

Put a good test on the refrigerator. Share their successes with family. Praise your kids for reading and completing homework on time.
