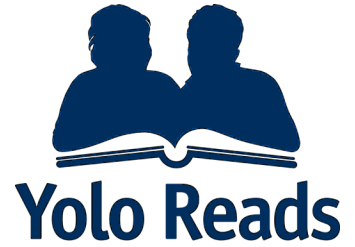

In the coming weeks Leticia will be contacting Yolo Reads Learners and their families with exciting learning opportunities.

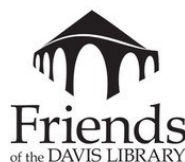
## SUMMER READING

Summer is a great time for Tutors & Learners to set reading goals together. It is also a good time to share books with your learner. This year's Summer Reading program at the Yolo County Library allows you to select your own books and participation level.

# COORDINATOR'S CORNER

## Nancy Pacheco

How do we find motivation to read over the summer? The key is to keep the motivation component 'alive and kicking'. As a family, we certainly do not want to view reading as a chore.

Start by letting your children choose what they would like to read. This is paramount to their identity as a future reader. You can always help guide their decision, but ultimately they should choose the book. This practice will ensure they are interested in the topic they are reading about and that they will continue reading. Consider discussing what you are currently reading with your family. This allows the child to see how passionate you are about reading.

Reading with your child is another way to lead by example. Schedule a time to read at home. Many families make it a habit to read together before bedtime. Reading together can encompass a broad definition of reading. It could be listening to an audiobook or radio program, for example. This could be a joint activity or a chance to practice a mindfulness activity.

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## TUTOR SUPPORT NETWORK MEETING

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Yolo Reads welcomed guest speaker Ariel Long, from the University of California, Davis. Ariel is a tutor at the Academic Assistance and Tutoring Center at UCD. Ariel joined our Tutor Support Network meeting to discuss the citizenship test literacy and tutoring pedagogy. Ariel organized a thought-provoking presentation from an academic standpoint. She covered the naturalization process; N-400 Application; going to the interview; and history civics portion. Her presentation put emphasis on the vocabulary used during the reading and writing portion of the exam.

Ariel also focused on the necessary foundations of tutoring. These include scaffolding and the zone of proximal development; the big three: positive reinforcement, practice problems and teach by asking questions; the importance of the process of learning, not the finished product such as grade level increase.

We are happy to announce Ariel will be joining us for our Tutor Support Network meeting on Tuesday, July 16th. Bring ideas, questions, and topics for discussion!

# AWAKENING THE BEST LITERACY TUTOR IN ALL OF US

## NCLC SYMPOSIUM

On May 3rd, the Northern California Library Coalition welcomed guest speakers to the Woodland Public Library. With over 50 library staff and volunteer tutors attending, many were excited to learn and participate in literacy informed discussion. The event opened



One tutor shared her expertise with the group and one tutor was brave enough to discuss her own battles with dyslexia. The group enjoyed a working lunch with the keynote speaker, Emily Sedwick, the project manager for the National Center for Families Learning

with Michael Evans, the Executive Director of the Kalamazoo Literacy Council.

Michael stated, “adults who struggle to read need a community that supports them, a learning environment that encourages them, and a positive message that is relevant to their world.” We learned how to address the issue of adult literacy in ways that raise awareness about the cause without adding stigma. Strategies for how to identify and approach potential struggling readers were discussed in addition to how to improve engagement practices with community partners.

A panel discussion addressed useful strategies for tutoring adults with learning disabilities. Facilitators Casandra Issaka & Sabrina Rosen-gren led the discussion with a panel of tutors.

[www.familieslearning.org](http://www.familieslearning.org). Emily spoke about the NCFL’s mission and how their resources can support library work in adult education. NCFL has specialized in family literacy for 30 years, and has many free resources, including a Learn to Earn Toolkit and a Volunteer Toolkit.

Katy Azevedo, from Butte County Library, covered USA Learns [www.usalearns.org](http://www.usalearns.org). This is a free interactive website which allows tutors to monitor their learners’ progress remotely. USA Learns has also incorporated a citizen component, making this program increasingly valuable. USA Learns offers intuitive courses that incorporate video lessons and thousands of learning activities to create effective and interactive lessons.

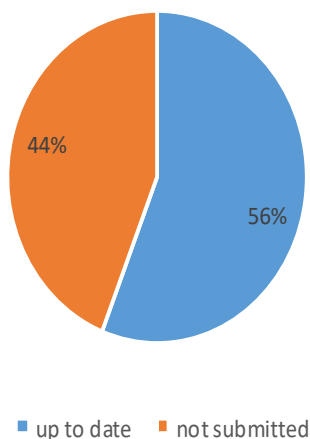
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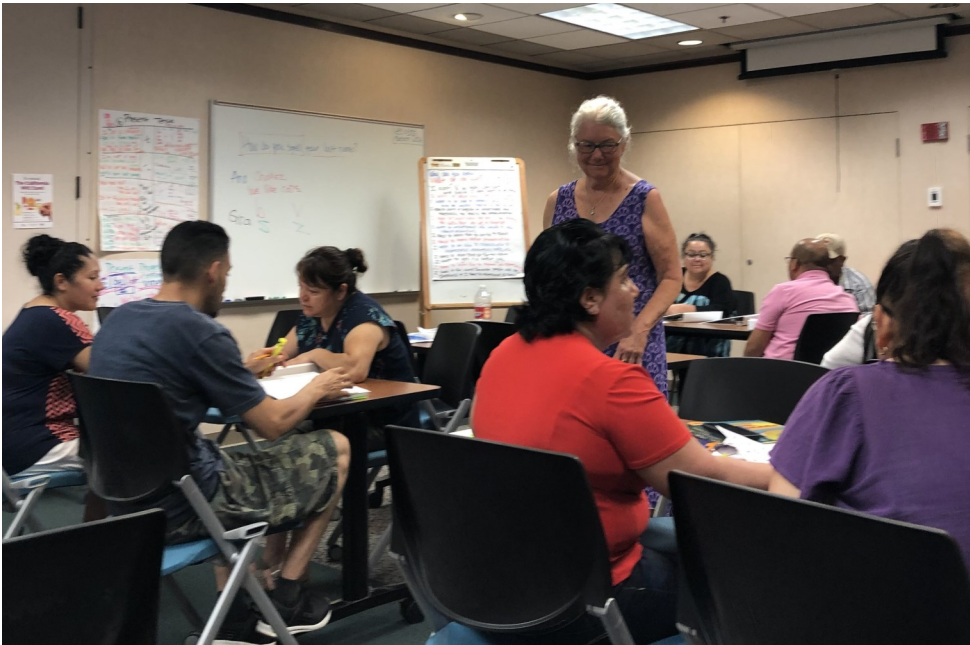
And Susan Vega, from the Chula Vista Library, covered how to use iPads in your tutoring sessions. Susan discussed free apps that we can use to teach and practice decoding, reading, math, and grammar. She focused on IOS devices (iPad, iPhone, iPod Touch) although Android devices were also discussed. If you would like copy of her presentation, please email Nancy Pacheco.

The event closed with Michael Evens delving into how to build effective literacy community collaboration. Michael highlighted his work to change the state of adult literacy at the community level and how this requires a mobilized collective impact effort on many fronts. It requires effort from our local government, school systems, social services, and employment efforts. Learning how to build effective collaborations that deliver positive outcomes for adult learners on a systemic level is possible. Our group was reminded once again; adult literacy is a community issue—not an agency issue.
