Annual Report 2023



2023 was a year of digitization and collections processing! Archives staff focused heavily on increasing access to our collection by participating in some very large digitization projects, as well as prioritizing the organization, rehousing, and cataloging of new and backlogged donations.

With support from the Friends, our Extra Help Library Assistant worked on cataloging and digitizing over 1,900 photographs from the Yolo County History Museum Photo Collection. Additionally, staff worked closely with the Clerk Recorder's Office and USImaging to digitize all of the property records in our collection.

Archives staff also spent time with the community this year. We had a table and display at both the Yolo County Women's History Month event in March and at the Sacramento Archives Crawl in October. We also had the pleasure of hosting a group of students from the Winters Participation Gallery at the Archives in June.

In July we welcomed Sarah Bartlett as our new Museum Curator. Sarah has been working on a collections inventory, digitization of objects, and development of new temporary and semi-permanent exhibits.

We are excited for 2024 where we will work towards curriculum creation and more outreach around our database, online resources, and collections.

Outreach and Community



The Archives and Historical Collection partnered with the Winters Branch Library to contribute scans of historical photos and artwork from the collections for a "ghost painting" program for adults and teens. Ghost painting is a recent social media trend that involves painting ghosts or other spooky additions into other pieces of art.

On Saturday, March 18th, Rachel tabled at the Yolo County Women's History Month Committee's event at the Gibson House. Rachel provided information to

attendees about the Archives' resources and services. To support the theme of "Celebrating Women Who Tell Our Stories," Rachel created a display on Veta Hurst Griggs, the author of <u>A Run Around the Block</u> (1967), a memoir about growing up in Woodland, CA at the turn of the twentieth century. students did a tour and listened to a presentation from Mel Russell about the importance of agriculture during WWI. Materials from the Archives were brought out to the Reading Room to help inspire the students' work on the

On June 22nd, Heather participated on a panel at Community, Hearts, and Minds: An Institute on Ethnic Studies Disciplinary Literacy. The three-day institute was part of the 2023 Summer Institutes put on by the California History-Social Science Project at UC Davis. Educators from across the state came together to focus on implementing Ethnic Studies in the TK-12 classroom. In addition to Heather, the other panelists were Christine Cheng (Instruction and Outreach Librarian UCD

Archives and Special Collections), Araceli Moreno (Youth Education Advocate, Save California Salmon), and Dr. Lorena V. Márquez (Associate Professor Chicano/a Studies UCD). Araceli and Lorena discussed their community centered projects around collecting histories from, and creating



curriculum about, Native American and Chicano/a communities. Christine and Heather emphasized the importance of Archives as both repositories for primary source materials and as collaborators with community groups to help preserve and raise awareness around the histories of underrepresented communities.



In October, Heather and Rachel tabled at the annual Sacramento Archives Crawl and interacted with **157 visitors**. The theme this year was "Myth, Folklore, & Legend." The Archives highlighted four Yolo County ghosts: the Woodland Opera House ghost, the 666 Dead Cat Alley ghost, the Snowball Mansion ghost, and the Werner-Hamel House ghost. The Lucy Snowball bookmarks were a big hit!

Collections

There were a number of digitization projects that took place over 2023.

With funding from the Friends, Archives staff and volunteers continued to work on


digitization projects. Inventorying, processing, and digitizing the Yolo Historical Museum Photo Collection was the main priority. The collection of 4000+

photographic prints, negatives, lantern slides, and tintypes were transferred to the Archives in spring of 2022. The images cover a wide range of Yolo County





locations, topics, and people, and it has already proven to be a useful resource for researchers. Staff were able to process and scan over **3,400 photos** (**1**,900 additional photographs since last year) from this collection. Archives staff were also able to digitize **44 indexes to property records**, **67 yearbooks**, and **99 maps**.



A new batch of audiovisual files are available to be viewed on the CA Revealed website. The digitized materials include 37 reels of Board of Supervisors meeting recordings, 4 reels of Woodland High School football films, and 21 VHS tapes



containing presentations, meetings, and documentary films about the Capay Valley from the Andrew E. Smith Collection. Explore digitized

degree in Anthropology. Sarah has experience in curation of digital and physical exhibits as well as training and certification in preservation. Sarah has also worked as a docent at a Victorian-era house museum.



Yolo County Historical Collection



With the hiring of a new curator, the Gibson House museum was able to reestablish open hours. Community members can now access the house every Thursday from 2-4pm for free. While in the house guests can explore the newly refreshed bottom floor complete with both newly displayed objects and didactic material. In October the museum welcomed over 100 visitors through its doors during community events. The house was open for the Woodland Stoll and the property hosted a concert by the Woodland Community Band. Additionally, this was the first year

that the Gibson House was open during Yolo Art's large Art Farm Fundraiser which brought a new audience to the house. Sarah has onboarded 4 volunteers to help with the documentation and preservation of the Yolo County Historical Collection and to continue the work of making it accessible to the public. Two of those volunteers have been photographing the collection and, with Sarah, have created digital versions of more than 400 objects.



Volunteers & Interns



We are so grateful for our volunteers! Over the course of the year they provided **798 hours of service** (192 hours less than last year). The reason for lost hours in 2023 was due, in part, to increased hours in 2022 from our intern and a reduction in hours at the beginning of 2023 when we lost four volunteers. In August we welcomed three new volunteers: Susan, Amy, and Hara! Volunteers have worked diligently on processing projects, digitization, and research requests.

After receiving a rare photo from a former Dingle School student who remembered walking by the house on his way to school in the 1960s, Archives staff delved into the history of the now-demolished Jackson-Curtiss House at 608 College Street in Woodland. With help from local historian David Wilkinson, we learned that the house was built by Dr. George H. Jackson in 1881

and was later remodeled in the 1920s by Elizabeth Curtiss.
