Portraits and Painters in the Yolo County Historical Collection

In 2023, the Yolo County Historical Collection sent fifteen frames and nine paintings to conservators to be restored. "Picturing Yolo County" features newly restored portraits made by and for Yolo County residents during the late 1800s. These portraits, while similar in style, exemplify the different ways that local artists chose to work within this art form. This exhibition examines Yolo County portraiture through the work of six 19th century local artists: Phoebe Olevia Hodgen, Calthea Campbell Vivian, Clara Brown, Louis Grund Joran, Carrie Blowers and Annie Blowers.

Collections Object Spotlight

Adlake Kero no. 4-40

This is the "Adlake Kero no. 4-40", a common signal tool used by train conductors. This one belonged to John Heinzen, who worked on the Pajaro Northern Railroad in Watsonville, CA. Adams & Westlake CO., or "Adlake," was one of the oldest and most successful railroad lantern manufacturers, which is why their products can be found in a number of collections across the country.



For railroad operators like Heinzen, these "kero lanterns" were an essential part of their profession. Even with the advent of handheld flashlights, in the early 1900s many workers still preferred kerosene lanterns. Their light could be seen across greater distances than a flashlight's, and their fuel had a longer lifespans than portable batteries at the time. These lanterns were valuable assets for the operators who needed quick and reliable methods to communicate with oncoming trains--especially in the dark of night. Kerosene lanterns were used on railways well into the mid-20th century. Eventually, after lanterns like this one were finally phased out in favor of electrical lamps, Adlake continued to produce souvenir models called "heritage lanterns," that have kept this iconic piece of railroad history alive for generations.

This year, a group of community partners are hosting a month-long Yolo County Black History Month.
