Collections Object Spotlight

1905 American
Folk Art Beaded Purse

This Victorian Folk Art purse came from the Doll family in Woodland CA.

The 19th Century Folk Art movement in the United States grew out of a celebration of local artisanal craftsmanship. The folk art movement focused on regionally significant methods and modes of art. Textile pieces such as this one, are some of the most common pieces of art as they built off skills people already had. While Folk Art often mimicked functional pieces, they were made to be displayed not used. The rise of Folk Art made art accessible and gave local artists a new platform to share their work. This purse likely came from the Northeast United States as it mimics styles made by the Iroquois in the 1880's and 1890's.

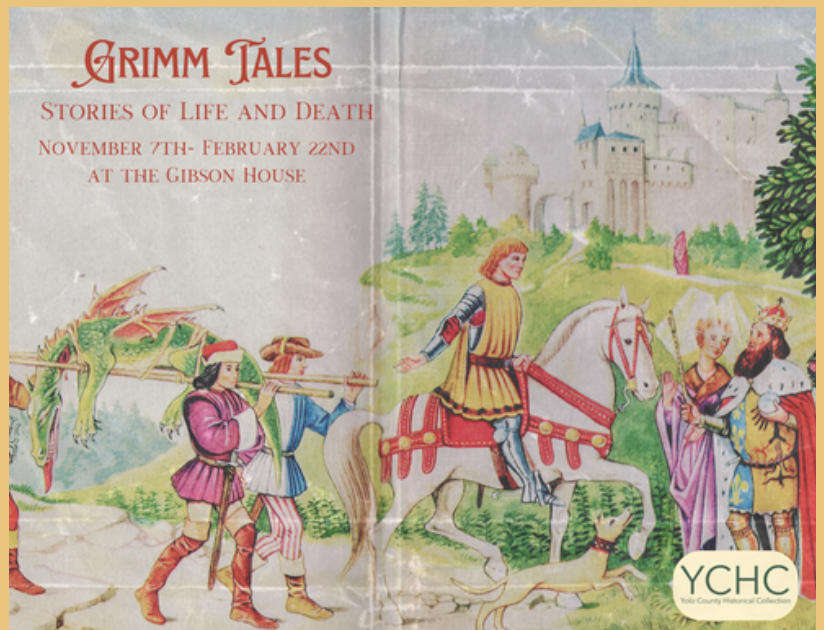
